	Brad called the meeting to order and welcomed all the delegates. Brad thanked the organizing committee for the 2010 World Wheelchair Rugby Championships for their work on that event and for hosting the General Assembly. He observed that the 2010 Worlds Championships were setting a new standard for wheelchair rugby competitions.

	Eron conducted the roll call of voting member. At the time of the roll call, twenty-one voting members were present. Absent were representatives from Austria, Norway, and Korea. Eron noted that a quorum was present

	New Zealand asked about the status of the Athletes Council. Eron explained that this was a goal but the council was not in place yet. As a first step IWRF is ensuring there is athlete representation on each committee. The IWRF needs to take the time to determine the most effective way to set up the Athletes Council.
	IRL requested that the Board be careful to ensure that all countries had the opportunity to have committee members appointed, not just those attending World Championships and Paralympic Games.

5.0	Minutes of the 2008 IWAS Wheelchair Rugby Sport Assembly
	The minutes of the 2008 IWAS Wheelchair Rugby Sport Assembly were presented to the General Assembly. Eron explained that the IWRF was a new organization, and it was not within the role of the IWRF to approve the

	minutes of a different organization. As IWAS Wheelchair Rugby was the organization with responsibility for the sport up until the formation of the IWRF, the minutes of the last Sport Assembly were being presented for inclusion in the records of IWRF.
6.0	Reports

6.1 Board of Directors

Eron presented the report of the Board of Directors, as included in the meeting documents.

6.2 Financial Statements

Cathy presented the Financial statements, noting that these were the final statements for IWAS Wheelchair Rugby from 2009. The assets of IWAS Wheelchair Rugby have been transferred to IWRF under the terms of the transfer of governance agreement with IWAS. Cathy noted that in spite of a slight loss in 2009 IWRF is continuing to do very well with limited funds. For the future, additional sources of revenue, ideally from sponsors, will be required.

Australia asked regarding the differences in some financial numbers from the fees charged; Cathy clarified that this was due to exchange rates. IWRF fees are set in US dollars but the bank accounts are in Canadian funds.

The 2010 IWRF Budget was then presented to the members.

Cathy then explained that as an independent federation, IWRF now needed to appoint auditors for the future. Cathy and Eron recommended the appointment of McKay Duff as auditors; they have worked with them in their capacity as auditors for the Canadian Wheelchair Sports Association. McKay Duff are based in Ottawa where our bank accounts are, and they are familiar with audit practices for sport organizations.

	Brad noted that Anne Hart would be stepping down as Chair of the Classification Committee. He thanked her on behalf of the IWRF for her hard work in this role over the past six years.

	Eron explained that as an independent sport federation and a member of the IPC, the IWRF was required to adopt anti-doping rules that complied with the World Anti-Doping Code. The IWRF Anti-doping Code has been prepared based on the IWAS Anti-doping Code which IWAS wheelchair rugby operated under. Changes have been made to the code to reflect the fact

	that IWRF only governs one team sport and that we do not conduct multisport events. The fundamental rules for anti-doping have not changed.

	Eron explained that the IWRF Board had considered two options for setting membership fees: continuing with a flat rate for all members, as was done for the initial fees in 2010; or setting a variable rate based on world rankings. The Board decided to move to a variable rate. This reflects the different funds available to national wheelchair rugby organizations, which tend to increase as the countries improve their rankings.
	The fees will be set to increase at a steady rate as a country moves from development to initial ranking and up the ranking list. The fees for 2011 have been set at a level which will bring in the same amount of membership revenue as in 2010; as more countries join IWRF and become internationally active, revenues will increase.

	Common fouls result from an illegal action that is the result of a genuine attempt to play the game. A foul committed by the team that has possession of the ball is referred to as an offensive foul. A foul committed by the team that does not have possession of the ball is referred to as a defensive foul.
	The sanction for an offensive common foul is a loss of possession.
	The sanction for a defensive common foul is a one-minute thirty second penalty served by the player who committed the foul.

	A player is not permitted to make flagrant or advantageous contact with an opponent during a stoppage in play.
	The period for legal contact begins when a referee blows his whistle prior to a tip-off or a throw-in, and ends the next time a referee blows his whistle.
	Each team will receive one warning per half for contact before the whistle. The second and subsequent incidents by a team will result in a foul.
	A contact warning given during the second half will continue into all periods of overtime play.

	b. A player is not permitted to help a teammate to defend or score by pushing with his hands or his wheelchair.

	A player who commits a flagrant foul shall be charged with two one technical fouls in addition to the common foul. The penalties are served consecutively, beginning with the common foul. If the sanction for the common foul is a loss of possession or a penalty goal, the player will begin serving the one-minute penalty for the first technical foul immediately.

	Eron advised that this motion had been discussed at length by the IWRF Board of Directors. The Board has serious concerns regarding the potential liability for the IWRF if the sanction for a flagrant foul is reduced, and does not support this motion. 	A player who commits a flagrant foul shall be charged with two technical fouls in addition to the common foul. The penalties are served consecutively, beginning with the common foul. If the sanction for the common foul is a loss of possession or a penalty goal, the player will begin serving the one-minute penalty for the first technical foul immediately.
	All players charged with a flagrant foul will be shown a yellow card. If a player is charged with a second flagrant foul in the same game the player shall be shown a red card and disqualified from the game.

	Anne Hart noted that the only time an athlete with sport class status P would have a change in classification would be if there was a change to the rules governing classification, or if the athlete was subject to a Chief Classifier's protest based on exceptional circumstances. Such a protest would have to have been filed at least six weeks prior to the tournament.

	USA suggested that there first be a review of what is currently paid. Canada noted that there are other expenses that IWRF may need to cover

	Eron noted that if this motion passed, it would only apply to future events that have not yet been sanctioned; events that have already been awarded will not be covered as agreements have already been reached with the LOCs. He also stated that if the LOCs were to pay these fees, the costs would be passed on to members through higher event registration fees.
	Canada and Great Britain both stated that the principle was good but that the details needed to be confirmed.

	Eron confirmed that, based on the discussion, this was clearly an area that merited further work. The IWRF would review the situation in consultation with the appropriate committees and there would be further proposals in this area.

The team that was victimized by the first offence flagrant foul would be awarded two goals. If the offending player receives a second flagrant foul (yellow card) in the same game or any subsequent games of the tournament then the offending player would be disqualified for the duration of that game. If the player receives any subsequent yellow cards in any other games of the tournament they would miss the duration of the game in which the yellow card is sanctioned. This system would continue for the duration of the tournament. In short if a player receives two or more flagrant fouls throughout a tournament they will miss the duration of the game in which the second or subsequent yellow card is issued.

	Brad explained to the General Assembly that it was customary to appoint new Chair to handle the elections process. He then asked for a motion to

	Eron thanked the members. He then proposed the appointment of Anne Hart and Carina Wahl as tellers for the election. As no opposition was noted, he proceeded with the appointment.
	Eron then explained the election process. All Board positions were up for election. An election would be held in turn for each of the positions of President, Vice President, Treasurer, and three Members at Large. Under the by-laws of the IWRF, elections must be held even if there is only one candidate for a position.
	8.1 President
	Eron introduced John Bishop and Ken Sowden, the candidates for President. Each was given a opportunity to briefly address the members.
	Ballots were distributed, marked, and returned. Eron reported that John Bishop had been elected President of the IWRF.
	8.2 Vice President
	Eron advised that with the election of John Bishop as President, Ken Sowden was the only remaining candidate for Vice President.
	Ballots were distributed, marked, and returned. Eron reported that Ken Sowden had been elected Vice President of the IWRF.
	8.3 Treasurer
	Eron advised that Cathy Cadieux was the sole candidate for Treasurer. Cathy was given a opportunity to briefly address the members
	Ballots were distributed, marked, and returned. Eron reported that Cathy Cadieux had been elected Treasurer of the IWRF.
	8.4 Member at Large
	Eron explained that there were five remaining candidates for election as

	Member at Large: Joke Beekman, Duncan Campbell, Juan Foa, Cherie Harris, and Terry Vinyard. Three member at large positions were available. One of these positions was for a term of four years and two for a term of two years.
	Eron instructed the members that they could vote for up to three candidates on their ballot. Ballots with one, two, or three votes would be valid and counted. To be elected, a candidate required the support of at least 50% plus one of the ballots cast. Eron explained that the elected candidate with the most votes would be elected to a four-year term, and the next two elected candidates would be elected to the two-year terms.
	If fewer than three candidates were elected In the first round of balloting, subsequent ballots would be held. In the event of a tie between candidates, a run-off ballot would be held.
	Each candidate was given a opportunity to briefly address the members.
	Ballots were distributed, marked, and returned. Eron reported that a total of 22 ballots had been cast. Twelve votes were required for election. Eron then reported that Duncan Campbell had been elected as Member at Large for a four-year term; and that Joke Beekman and Terry Vinyard had been elected as Members at Large for two-year terms.
	Eron thanked the members and relinquished the Chair to Brad.
9.0	Closing
	In closing, Brad thanked the outgoing members of the IWRF Board for their contributions to the success of the organization and expressed the wish that they continue to be involved in IWRF in the future. Brad congratulated the new Board and wished them success in the future, and thanked all the members for their participation and their contributions. He also remarked on the growth of the sport of wheelchair rugby and the IWRF over the many years that he has been involved, and expressed his appreciation for the many people he has worked with over the years. Although he is stepping down as President, he intends to stay involved with the sport and looks forward to continuing to work with many of us in the future.
